8	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: or should I read the framer
9	first?

11	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Okay. Let's see, call to
12	order oh, no, it says have the TOWN CLERK call the roll
13	call first, and then I'll read it.
14	TOWN CLERK: Okay. All right. Deputy
15	Supervisor Xlander?
16	DEPUTY SUPERVISOR XLANDER: Here.
17	TOWN CLERK: Councilperson Nye?
18	COUNCILPERSON NYE: Here.
19	TOWN CLERK: Oh, he's here, okay. Councilperson
20	Leighton?
21	COUNCILPERSON LEIGHTON: Here.
22	TOWN CLERK: Councilperson Bensley?
23	COUNCILPERSON BENSLEY: Here.
24	TOWN CLERK: Supervisor Rounds?
25	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Here.

I, Supervisor Rounds, have confirmed with the

Council that this meeting is being held in compliance with

Executive Order 202.1 issued by Governor Andrew M. Cuomo

on March 12th, 2020.

The Executive Order suspends Article 7 of the Public Office (inaudible) -- it is not necessary to let any public body to meet and take any action, authorized by law without permitting the public in person access to meetings and authorizing such meetings to be held remotely by camera or some other device or services. This meeting is being held remotely via Zoom Virtual Meetings Software -- the public has the ability to view or listen to this meeting by via the Zoom app, web browser, or -- and/or by telephone.

This meeting is being recorded and will be transcribed at a later date. I'd like to make a resolution -- a motion to make a resolution to adopt the audited claims.

DEPUTY SUPERVISOR XLANDER: So move.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Second?

MR. NYE: Second, second, Nye.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: (Inaudible) --

DEPUTY SUPERVISOR XLANDER: Elizabeth, I put a sticky note on a few vouchers yesterday.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Let me see if I can remember

the ones you had the questions about.

One of the ones was the invoice for the transcribe. We have to spend \$175 to have this recording transcribed by an independent company.

DEPUTY SUPERVISOR XLANDER: Oh.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: So, that one bill was for \$175 so we will have this meeting, last meeting, and then I'm pretty sure our Board Meeting the next two weeks will also have to be transcribed because I don't think we'll be able to go back to go back to an open meeting until after June. Is that correct, Alan?

MR. POPE: That's correct. I think it's going to be a while before we're back in person. So, we continue just like this.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Right, okay.

DEPUTY SUPERVISOR XLANDER: Well, Dean and I were there together doing the vouchers and we kind of thought that it might have something to do with that. And then there was another voucher that was a telephone service one, and we had a question about whether we were paying for long distance calls as opposed to --

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: No, we just have 11 lines.

You know there's a -- I think it's \$33 a line, plus a

\$6 whatever. So, it's taxes and so forth, that's what it

comes out to be. So, we don't pay for long distance

calls.

DEPUTY SUPERVISOR XLANDER: Okay. And then there was the Storm Water Coalition Invoice and we wondered --

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Yes.

DEPUTY SUPERVISOR XLANDER: -- and we wondered what we get for that money.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: There's two MS-4's, one is for \$1500 which is just like our annual dues, and now there's a \$2200 which we knew that was going to happen, and that was for them helping us do the mapping of it, and Nick could maybe answer that a little bit more clearly, but we did get an invoice for two separate bills, one for \$1500 and one for \$2200, and that's all part of the coalition we're involved in, but we are going to have to do some mapping. Is that correct, Nick?

NICK: Yeah, yes. Am I on speaker?

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Yeah.

DEPUTY SUPERVISOR XLANDER: Yeah.

 $\,$ NICK: My first time on a computer. I usually do it through phones.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: So, that's what it is. So, and we did get something from the E.P.A., so we are working with them as to how -- to make sure we draw up a compliance with that at this time.

3	DEPUTY SUPERVISOR XLANDER: No.
4	COUNCILPERSON NYE: Yeah.

6	COUNCILPERSON NYE: Elizabeth Elizabeth
7	the transcript that we're talking about I believe it's
8	like 39 pages, and that what they do they transcribe
9	everything that issaid?
10	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Everything that's said.

12	39 pages?
13	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Yes. \$175 per meeting, so
14	let's make it quick.
15	DEPUTY SUPERVISOR XLANDER: Yeah.
16	COUNCILPERSON NYE: Good luck with that one.
17	Okay. bye.
18	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: See you. So, yes, it's by
19	the page, and that's then they transcribe, and I guess
20	what was a little disappointing that I do have to say is
21	when Vickie reviewed it, there was all kinds of mistakes.
22	All kinds of mistakes.
23	COUNCILPERSON NYE: Can we deduct money for each
24	mistake?
25	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: We were paying 50,000

what was that, Vickie, \$50,000 for something and it was only \$500 or --

TOWN CLERK: Yeah, 50 -- I think it was \$50,000 for \$50 per meeting, and they also had that we had over 500 employees.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Yeah.

TOWN CLERK: And that was just a couple of things that stuck out, but there were quite a few errors.

COUNCILPERSON NYE: So, is that

TOWN CLERK: I went through it, corrected it, and provided it to Alan's paralegal and they sent it back to the Czerenda and Czerenda provided us with a corrected copy which is posted on the website.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Thank you.

DEPUTY SUPERVISOR XLANDER: Elizabeth, there was another question that Dean and I talked about. It was about the dog shelter and the payments for dogs when the owner has been identified, and the question was, do we bill back the owner for the fees we incur? I didn't think we did.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: No. It is part of it. We have to provide a shelter that we can take the dogs to if they're -- even after the -- now, actually if we can identify the owner before we take the dog, then we don't take the dog. But dogs are not adopted until officers go

1	to great extents to find out who the owner is, and that's
2	just part of the cost. But I'll be honest with you, being
3	since we went with the Humane Society our costs have
4	been cut in half because we pay by the dog now versus we
5	paid a monthly fee before.
6	COUNCILPERSON NYE: Yeah, I (inaudible)
7	DEPUTY SUPERVISOR XLANDER: All righty.
8	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: No, if there's any medical
9	treatment for the dogs and they do know who the owner is,
10	we don't pay for that. It's just a flat fee for taking
11	the dog, you know, to the shelter.
12	COUNCILPERSON NYE: So, we're paying \$2 \$255
13	bucks a dog.
14	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Correct.
15	COUNCILPERSON NYE: If we know the owner
16	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Pardon me.
17	COUNCILPERSON NYE: is there any way we can
18	bill them for that cost?
19	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: I don't think there's a way
20	we can bill them.
21	TOWN ATTORNEY POPE: You would have to change
22	your dog
23	law.
24	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Right. This is a service we

provide, but like I said, we've cut that invoice in half,

so now we just pay by the dog.

COUNCILPERSON NYE: Right.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: It's just part of the --

COUNCILPERSON LEIGHTON: Why don't we just tie them up in Nick's office?

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: All right. Any other questions about the vouchers?

DEPUTY SUPERVISOR XLANDER: I have a question for Alan. I wonder if any towns that you've worked with do that billing back the owner?

MR. POPE: The Town of Union, we have some bill-backs. I can't remember what exactly they are, but we can easily put it into the local law and then, you know, if it's something we can collect, we can collect, and if it's some owner that moves out of the town or we just can't do anything with, then you know, but we can bill it in. We can look at that if you like.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Well, part of the problem, I think, Alan, too, and I don't mean to be like -- some people if they knew they had to pay us back, I mean they may abandon the dog. I mean maybe they weren't good owners to begin with then, but you just wonder if they abandon the dog at the Humane Society if they knew they would have to pay it back.

DEPUTY SUPERVISOR XLANDER: I think by the time

they got their bill they'd have the dog back at their

home, so I don't know that they would turn around and take

it back to the shelter.

something we can talk about and see. I'll put it down -
COUNCILPERSON LEIGHTON: Well, don't they get

fined for a loose dog, and how much is the -- the fine

should at least cover the expenses?

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Well, that's certainly

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Well, I mean if your dog

gets out and for some reason you're not -- we can't -- by

mistake and we can't find out who the owner is, is like

you know we'll go to some extent to find out who the owner

is, maybe ask a few neighbors, but I guess I just -
sometimes things happen and then the dog can get out. So,

why would we fine somebody if it was a mistake, or an

accident? I mean maybe we should say that you have to pay

the Town back for the cost of taking the dog there,

that's a different story, but to fine them unless it's a

chronic abuser. We can look into changing the law

possibly and charging people back, you know, for our

services of picking up your dog. Any other questions?

Okay. Vickie, call roll call, please.

7	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Well, the cleanup days, we
8	have it down under unfinished business.
9	DEPUTY SUPERVISOR XLANDER: Well, it's under
10	communications and announcements as well.
11	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: And what was the other
12	thing, Vickie?
13	TOWN CLERK: Memorial Day,
14	Monday, May 25th, the building is being closed.
15	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Okay. That's if we're
16	opened by then. Anything else?
17	TOWN CLERK: Nothing, that's it.
18	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Planning Board, anything
19	going on there?
20	DEPUTY SUPERVISOR XLANDER: No, nothing until
21	our next meeting which will be July 13th at $6:30$ and I^\prime m
22	not sure if that will be a virtual meeting, or in person.
23	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Hopefully, it will be in
24	person.
25	Zoning Board, Nick, anything going out there?

Can't hear you, Nick, yeah, there you go. 1 2 NICK: Nope, nothing. SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Okay. Youth Commission 3 Park? 4 5 COUNCILPERSON LEIGHTON: Nothing since last The next meeting is the 21st. It will be probably 6 month. 7 another Skype or Zoom Meeting. SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: I did talk to Chris just the 8 9 other -- I did talk to Chris the other day. They are 10 going to try to do some kind of modified season, when they 11 get the okay which at this point, I'm not sure when that 12 will be, but they are going to try to do some type of 13 modified season. I do know that The Jordan Godabout 14 Tournament has been cancelled. It takes place the second 15 week of July. I know, Nick, you said that the DWI Girls 16 Softball Tournament is still on. 17 Yeah, so far, it is. NICK: 18 SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: They will be allowed to use 19 Jackson Park, if it still takes place, because you know 20 there was a conflict originally, but now that -- because 21 of the other tournament being cancelled, there is no 22 conflict. 23 Chris -- I mean everybody wants to do something 24 for the -- the sports program and even if it's just a

month long, or modified type of thing, but I have to say I

agree. I feel it's good for morale, it's good for the kids, it's good to have them be out. You know, we've been guarantined for a long time now, so --

Code Enforcements, Buildings, and ground, Nick?

NICK: Not -- you know, nothing -- it's been

pretty quiet. There's a lot of just little things here

and there. We talked about the Cell Tower. I talked to

the lady today. She's going to reach out to the Manager

-- her Manager about possible, you know, who she works

for, and who we could get a better service with.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Just so everyone knows, Nick was contacted by a design company or an architect company about rebuilding one of the towers or the service that's being offered by one of the towers up on Ingraham Hill Road, and I said to Nick, well, maybe this is a good opportunity that we have someone's ear now that wants us to give them approval for updating their service. Why can't we find out who they're working for and talk to them about how we can extend our service? So, I don't know if anything will come of that, but it's worth a try to see if we can talk to somebody about that.

Talking about services updated, the Spectrum is completed on Hance Road. There are 20 new -- 22 new houses that now have Spectrum available to them.

But one of the interesting things, and Mike Bensley, I don't know, if -- if Matt had Seltzer or Spectrum where he lives. He did, he does. But one of things we found out today, confirmed it today, about Spectrum is the houses up on Stevens Road, between Park and Morgan, we have had a complaint a couple of weeks ago about a resident that lives on Stevens Road that they are very frustrated because they have Frontier Dial Up as a feature, and they keep bopping their calls and blah, blah, blah, and I said, well, let's find out because of the success they had on Hance Road. Let's try to see if we could see if we could (inaudible) but that's not an immediate fix. And I talked to Tommy Egan, he recommended that maybe these people should look into Plexicom, and so they were working with Plexicom, and in the meantime, Mike Donahue last week went up and down that part of Stevens Road and found out that there were cable service that was run on that part. Well, how come they never told the residents that they now have (inaudible) more available. So, I said, well, I'm going to call Spectrum today from this, you know, Mike saw the service. So, sure enough, I called, I gave them the people's address and they said, yeah, you have service there, and I'm like, okay. So, I called the resident when, in the meantime, the resident just by chance, because obviously we started the

conversation had called Spectrum, and sure enough within the last year Spectrum had put service on that road, on Stevens Road, between Park and Morgan. So, how crazy is it that they offer service and they never told anybody that there is service there now?

So, I mean I guess because I am going to be driving with Tom Eagan down Hance Road and have him point out to me because he knows the people, or knows every address on that road that had recently had the opportunity to get Spectrum and we're going to personally reach out to each of them and just say, just an F.Y.I., you now have Spectrum Service available to you, if you want it or not, but it is available, because obviously Spectrum doesn't do that. So, I can't understand why they wouldn't let their residents know, or their new customers -- potential new customers know that this is now available. But Tom Eagan and all the people that were at our board meeting were all set. They are happy campers.

DEPUTY SUPERVISOR XLANDER: Good.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: So, anyway, Nick, we'll continue to see if they could talk to us about cell service --

NICK: I mean one more thing, I mean our permit for the cell towers is \$1000, and that's what I charged them, so I feel we could probably up it --

2	Nick, or is that just replacing old things?
3	NICK: Yeah, I mean it's working on the
4	power. If it requires an engineer or something, we get
5	no revenue from the cell tower, so
6	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Okay.
7	NICK: it's our I mean \$1000 to them is
8	nothing compared to what they're going to get, you
9	know.
10	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Right.
11	NICK: So, it's just something to think about.
12	We don't have to talk about it now, but we want to up it,
13	because we can up it up a little bit if we wanted to.
14	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Okay. Well, then we do have
15	Gordon Ichikawa, because I'm interested in putting up the
16	power, so maybe if we could tap into this company, we
17	could see what we could do for that.
18	Also, I guess, Nick, I might as well think that
19	this is a good time for us to talk about
20	COUNCILPERSON NYE: Look at the big bear.
21	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: I'm sorry.
22	COUNCILPERSON NYE: Mike's got a big bear
23	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: I saw that. Mike, you've
24	got a bear in your backyard, Mike?
25	COUNCILPERSON BENSLEY: Looking at him.

1	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Mike, turn your camera, so
2	we can see turn your camera around.
3	DEPUTY TOWN CLERK: Take a picture.
4	COUNCILPERSON NYE: Turn your camera.
5	COUNCILPERSON BENSLEY: No, he's roaming into
6	the woods.
7	TOWN CLERK: Bear sighting, Paula.
8	DEPUTY TOWN CLERK: I hear that.
9	NICK: At the time, it was a costume.
10	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: This is a question for you.
11	On Park Avenue, we had a fire that took place
12	right before the COVID-19 hit, and the house Nick has
13	condemned the house and it's not repairable neither I
14	mean the firemen just took half the contents of the house
15	and threw it all over the yard, and Nick has called out to
16	somebody like when it first happened, but then had not
17	been able to get through to somebody. Well, he found out
18	yesterday that the residents of the property have been
19	paid for the damage to their house.
20	Now, Nick had called the insurance company that
21	the house has been condemned but it's not re-habitable.
22	So, how do we force this man to take care of that piece of

property?

MR. POPE: Just ordinary code wise, I mean if

it's in violation, Nick would send them an order to

remedy. If they don't do it, we'd bring them into Court.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: So, let me ask you, I have

sneaky suspicion that this guy is just going to walk away

from this property, because now he got paid for it. I just don't understand how the insurance company can pay him this money and not take care of the property.

MR. POPE: I mean we still -- we still have to go through the process, unless -- unless there's some emergency application we can do, you know, to declare it unsafe, but we'd still, absent an emergency, we'd still have to go through a public hearing like we've done before on a few of the properties.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Okay. So -- so the first step is to send out an order of remedy?

MR. POPE: Yeah.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Because it is an unsafe structure and I am concerned that obviously people know that it's been abandoned.

MR. POPE: Well, I really think if it's truly an unsafe structure, then you know the first issue is, is it an emergency situation where under our Code, Nick could go and post it, and we could do an expedited, you know, hearing so we got to get notice out to the property owner,

1 but we can do an expedited public hearing, and hold it at the regular meeting. You'd have to vote on that, and I'd 2 have to kind of look at -- I don't have the Code Book 3 right with me, but I'd have to look at whether we can get 4 5 that notice out in enough time to put it on our regular meeting. I think we should be, but I'd have to look at 6 7 the Codes. Well, we wouldn't have the 10-day TOWN CLERK: 8 9 Notice, you know, for the newspaper, the Country Courier, 10 if we tried to do it on the 19th, because it wouldn't be 11 able to go in until the 13th, and that only gives us five 12 days. 13 MR. POPE: Right, so you would have to decide 14 whether you want to spend the money with the press --15 TOWN CLERK: Right. 16 MR. POPE: -- or put it over to the work 17 session. Is anybody living there now? 18 No, nobody is living there. I've already 19 condemned that (inaudible) so I think it's -- I think it's 20 just like one of those standard procedures where an unsafe 21 structure has to be burned out. 22 MR. POPE: Yeah. Is it accessible or is it

NICK: Yeah, the insurance company boarded it up. It's boarded up, and I tried to reach out to the home

boarded up?

owner and his voicemail is full, so I can't leave a message either.

MR. POPE: Yeah. So, I think, you know, we have to take reasonable actions in the face of an unsafe structure so it's -- it's been posted, it's boarded up, so I think there's no rush to do it for our next Board Meeting. The Board could vote tonight to proceed ahead with, you know, that process under the Unsafe Building Code and that would allow Nick and I to get the notice out to Vickie to get it posted, serve the owner, and we could have that hearing the next work session if you want to do it at the next work session.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Well, we couldn't have it at the next, okay -- So, I'd like to go on to make a motion that we can discuss it and then have a vote. Is that okay?

MR. POPE: Yes, that's fine from our end.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: So, I'd like to make a Motion under the Unsafe Building Code to -- what am I going to say, Alan?

MR. POPE: To initiate that process and authorize the Enforcement Officer, Town Attorney, and TOWN CLERK to prepare and post the Notice and serve it on the owner.

2	what you just said, and say make a motion?
3	MR. POPE: Yeah, you can.
4	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Okay. I'd like to make that
5	motion.
6	MR. BENSLEY: So moved, Bensley.
7	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Second?
8	MR. LEIGHTON: Leighton.
9	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Any discussion?
10	MR. BENSLEY: None other than I think you're
11	right, Elizabeth. I don't see them coming back and
12	fixing that place up.
13	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: So, the only thing
14	that Nick can say, the people who bought the house going
15	south on Park, are the Sepes did I say their last name,
16	they own the third home?
17	NICK: Yeah.
18	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: They're interested in buying
19	that property.
20	NICK: They approached him right off the bat.
21	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: So maybe once we serve him,
22	and he understands that maybe he would contact them,
23	because they even said they would tear the property the
24	building down, right, Nick?
25	NICK: Yes.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: So I think maybe once we get the ball rolling, it might get the owner then to, you know, react and answer to Sepes.

COUNCILPERSON NYE: Elizabeth, the only question

I would have for Alan. Can we go to the insurance

company

and ask them why they didn't provide funding to tear it

down?

MR. POPE: We're not a named insured so they might have, and that might have been part of their homeowner policy, but it's not like we're a mortgage company where we get a seat at the table to get a part of those proceeds. We're just the government. So, he might have very well gotten those proceeds, put it in his pocket, and is prepared to walk away, absent us going through this process.

COUNCILPERSON NYE: The process will bring that up.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Yeah.

MR. POPE: Maybe, maybe not. I mean he doesn't have to disclose what insurance he had or what he did with the money, that's not part of our code, and keep in mind our code really only relates to the property itself. It doesn't force anybody to pay to fix it. Right? Just like there's laws out there saying you have to pay your real

1	property taxes, but if you don't, you walk away from the
2	property, there's no individual liability. I mean the
3	County just forecloses.
4	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: That's what I figured means
5	this way the County I mean he is paid up on his taxes,
6	but yet we could force his hand, you know, he may then be
7	interested in selling it if he's not if he's just going
8	to walk away with the money.
9	MR. POPE: Yes, and the way we word those
10	notices, you know, they're going to understand that they,
11	you know, have some consequences if they just ignore us.
12	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Okay. Any other discussion?
13	MR. POPE: Okay.
14	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: All in favor?
15	DEPUTY SUPERVISOR XLANDER: Aye.
16	COUNCILPERSON NYE: Aye.
17	COUNCILPERSON LEIGHTON: Aye.
18	COUNCILPERSON BENSLEY: Aye.
19	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Opposed? Okay. Motion
20	carried. And then we'll get together Alan and make sure
21	we have this ready for our next work session.
22	MR. POPE: Yes.
23	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Okay. All right. Nick,
24	anything else?
25	NICK: No, that's it.

1 SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Okay. Mike, Highway 2 Department? Mike, you've got to --3 MR. DONAHUE: Do you hear me now? 4 SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Yeah, we can hear you. 5 MR. DONAHUE: All right. Nick, you may want to check with John Martin's Office because 2014 we were in 6 7 violation with the EPA about the map and the mapping was done on all the outflows of the storm system. 8 9 NICK: Beyond the letter we just got from the 10 B.C.? 11 MR. DONAHUE: We already did mapping of the 12 complete storm system. Clark Patterson did the mapping. 13 That was a violation in 2014. That was one of the things 14 that was required to do the mapping before you let that 15 coalition remap it again. I am pretty sure they 16 GPS'd all of the outflows on it. I'll check with John. 17 NICK: 18 MR. DONAHUE: Yeah, because I'm pretty sure 19 there's got to be a set of plans someplace. I might have a 20 set but I'm pretty sure you were taking over the MS-4 at 21 the time. 22 NICK: Okay. 23 MR. DONAHUE: We had the Auctions International. 24 The Excavator sold for \$45,500. The tractor sold for 25 \$23,300. So that's all set.

And up on Cynthia Drive and Laurie Brook

(inaudible) put work in, we repaired all the catch basins

and the manholes. They milled it today, and they're going

to pave tomorrow on Cynthia and Laurie Brook. So, that

will be all done.

Also, the billing of the water and sewer -we're going to have to really start taking a look at the
billing of the sanitary, because our revenues are not
keeping up with our expenses, okay. We calculated it
about -- we're losing about \$10,000 per quarter with the
sanitary.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Okay. I think we -- you and I might need to do that, so we can make a presentation at the Board Meeting and really see how we're going to have to raise our rates.

MR. DONAHUE: Yeah, because it takes a full billing cycle before you can raise your rate.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Right. So, we'll have to do that at the -- we'll get that information together so we'll have it at the Board Meeting.

MR. DONAHUE: Okay. Those are all the water and sewer bills that are out. Nadine is taking care of them from home, and I guess she's doing all the deposits and stuff like that, and it's pretty much what's been happening.

1	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Well, we did also get the
2	bid back for the lining. So, there we got seven bids.
3	So, John Martin's Office has them, and will be reevaluated
4	and everything and then we'll award the bid at the next
5	Board Meeting.
6	MR. DONAHUE: Yeah, the bids came in anywhere
7	from like \$96,000 to \$147,000, so there's quite a bit of
8	difference from a few companies.
9	DEPUTY SUPERVISOR XLANDER: What was that again,
10	Elizabeth, what you said that was for?
11	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: At the sewer lining. You
12	know last year we did a lining last year.
13	DEPUTY SUPERVISOR XLANDER: Yeah.
14	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: They're doing another 2800
15	at 28 linear feet 2800 linear feet.
16	DEPUTY SUPERVISOR XLANDER: Okay. Thanks.
17	MR. DONAHUE: And that's pretty much what's been
18	happening. Hope the weather will warm up, or it don't
19	snow Saturday.
20	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Here? No one is here for
21	the Volunteer Fire Department.
22	TOWN CLERK: Okay.
23	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: And for the Supervisor's
24	report, so for a Coronavirus Update, I did listen I had
25	a conference call with Jason today, and I did listen to

his presentation. I don't know if anybody heard him So, the Southern Tier looks like we're in really today. good shape to be able to have part of it reopened by the 15th. There's four state criteria and the southern -- you know we're all opening as regions, not by county, so there's eight counties in the southern tier, and all eight counties are all in pretty good shape. Broome County is the biggest county in those eight counties, so we're taking like lead agency on this. You know it's contact 10 tracing, it's our hospital capacity it's lowering the amount of hospitalizations over a 14-day period, and I 12 forget what the other one was. Oh, making sure you have enough PPE at your hospitals, and all those four criteria 14 Right now, there is only -- we have been in we have met. 15 contact with the hospitals daily. There's only six people in the hospital right now. We're down to having 95 16 17 positive cases, but positive cases aren't relevant at this 18 point -- oh, testing -- that was the other thing, 19 We have to test 30 people out of a 1000 -- 30 testing. 20 people out of every 1000 in the County have to be tested monthly. So, the State is giving the County 1500 tests a 22 week, so meeting that goal is not going to be difficult. We have to have 30 people on staff for every 100,000 people in our population to do the contact testing. we actually have 60, but the County has actually moved

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around some positions so that we have 100, so we can make sure that the other seven counties have enough people, as well, to do the contact tracing.

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So, with that being said, then there's a bunch of little things that fit into these four major categories, and so at this point it looks like some Counties will be allowed to reopen, Phase One, and this is where, as a business owner and as Supervisor of the Town of Binghamton, we get a little frustrated, because Phase One is construction and manufacturing, but what they're not getting from the Governor is a little bit more details like let's say we meet all of this criteria even by this Friday, you know, we can meet this criteria, so why can't we use that time, and count as part of the two weeks. Everything is supposed to be supposedly a two-week intervals, so I'm just questioning we're ready now to hit Phase One, why do we have to wait to the 15th, and then have to wait to the 30th for Phase Two? So, Phase Two would be where its -- its professional services which is what Jason is saying, and why are you smiling? All right. I can't hear you.

Anyway, professional services, retail, those are places that will be in Phase Two, so -- so if things don't move along a little quicker, we may not be able to open Town Hall until sometime towards the end of May, and I

won't be able to open my business until sometime by the end of May. So, that's a little frustrating, but that's where we are right now, and he's -- things change on a daily basis, so, do you have a question, Dean?

MR. NYE: Yeah, I thought it was important that some individuals -- that I get tested for the Covid-19, not the anti-spotting but the stick in the nose kind of (inaudible) because I thought that would help the County's numbers in terms of testing so we can get reopened. I dialed a number, I got an appointment, went down to the B.U. event actually and a very swift process, it doesn't take long at all, and I think that it -- it's my understanding is that that will help us open up the Town.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: The testing is --

MR. NYE: (Crosstalk) --

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: They're not talking at all about the testing because they want to --

MR. NYE: It's part of the criteria.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: -- test 500 people in two days over at the B.U. -- so us at the meeting are the requirement for the testing and if that quickly -- and we have to have the testing in place, but it's not like we have to have -- this is -- we have to be able to do 30 tests per 1000 in a month's period of time. So, the testing isn't the problem. I'm surprised that you were

able to do it though, Dean, because right now they're only 1 2 testing essential workers. Are you deemed essential? MR. NYE: No, but I'm almost 100 years old, so 3 old that I want to have it done. 4 5 SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Right. MR. NYE: (Inaudible) -- same criteria. 6 7 SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Right. (Crosstalk) --MR. NYE: Well, I thought it was important to do 8 9 that to help the numbers in Broome County, and hopefully 10 it will be negative. 11 SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: I hope so, too, but if it is 12 you're not going to know if you have the antibody anyway, 13 right? 14 It requires another test. MR. NYE: 15 different test and it's really not available, only for 16 those who tested positive, I guess. 17 SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Okay. So, that's 18 I mean I'm hoping that -where we are. 19 If you're talking direct in Albany --MR. NYE: 20 SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Pardon. 21 No, go ahead. MR. NYE: 22 SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: No, I was just saying I was 23 hoping -- so Nick and I and Mike have been working on the 24 protocol that will take place in Town Hall, and we have a 25 pretty good idea what's going to happen as far as, you

know, where -- residents coming into Town Hall. Every resident that comes into Town Hall will have to stop six feet in front of Becky's Office, and Becky will then find out where they want to go to call over to that Department if they're not someone already there, the person would be allowed to go, we're thinking the (inaudible) the assessor's offices will have one person each that will be allowed to be there at the time, and then they will exit out of that door on that side of the building. Becky will always -- Becky is planning on working when we can reopen for like a two-week period every day so we can manage, and I don't think we're going to be inundated with residents, but we will be turning the ladies' bathroom into an employees' only bathroom, and --

TOWN CLERK: Thank you.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: What?

TOWN CLERK: I said, thank you

for doing that.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: -- so if we have a resident who has to go to the restroom will be using the men's room, and everyone will know, any person who comes in -- well, you can use the women's room because you're an employee. Anyone who comes into Town Hall will be directed and will be controlled by -- so, she's not just going to send somebody over to the Code Office, not

knowing that Nick is there or not. She will know if he is there or not and then send the person over, or take a message and Nick will call them back.

So, as far as cleaning, you know Zack will be cleaning. We've got a lot of masks. You know, we're not -- our Town Hall is set up that we can be six feet apart. We all have individual offices, except for Vickie and Paula.

So, Vickie and Paula can choose to wear masks in their office or not, that's their decision, but we all need to be respectful of how everyone else feels. So, as an example today, there was three of us in the Board Room, more than six feet apart, and we had our masks on. I needed to take mine off, and I asked before I took it off, if anybody was bothered by that, and no one was bothered. So, those are the kind of courtesies that we need to do. When I'm in my office, I spoke to people at Town Hall about that. I won't wear a mask in my office, but if someone needed to come in and talk to me, I would put one on, but really the way our phone system is set up, you can call and talk over the phone if that's what you would prefer to do.

So, that's our protocol. Hopefully, we'll be able to open sooner than the end of May, but we're ready to go and we'll have that all documented. We'll be

sending it to all the employees and so everybody has it, there's no questions. Nick is actually going to build a plexiglass piece or a piece of plastic that will fit into Amy's door, it would be halfway and we're going to put a little table underneath it, but she will be able to take residents' paperwork through the slot at the bottom of the -- between the table and the plastic. Does anybody have any input about that? Okay.

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Anything outside of the Supervisor's Report. Onto unfinished business. So, we are going to have a proceeding with our cleanup days. It will be next -- a week from this Thursday and Friday. It's going to be run through Becky's Office. We have two dumpsters going up to the Highway Department and two large dumpsters are going to be at Town Hall. So, that way the working residents will be able to bring their trash, not trash, like their household -- anything they want to dispose of. If you are a senior -- we are not allowed to take any electronics at this time, or nothing with Freon in it. That has been posted on the form because those departments are kind of semi-closed right now up at the landfill. So we can when they reopen it, we can do an electronicat a different time, but -- so residents have already been starting to call and ask questions. So, if you have a piece of furniture that you cannot break down and take it in your

car and bring it to the Town, we will pick up a piece of furniture for you, or if you are a senior, and need help, but this is not the Town Hall helping you clean out your garbage or your basement. People have to understand that. It's a little different from last year. It will be a little more streamlined because the electronics last year, we took 10 tons of electronics last year, and six tons of the residents' trash. So, the electronics were one-and-ahalf times more. So, without that, this time it should be a little more streamlined, but the residents will be required to empty out their own cars or trucks, whatever they bring, and a resident can come five times if they want, as long as we have space in the dumpster, but we're not picking up truckloads of trash for people. questions? And then we'll be -- the Taylor said that let's say at the end of Thursday we have a full dumpster, they could come and pick up that dumpster and store it at Taylors, because our drop off day up at the landfill is on May 19th.

NICK: 19th.

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SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: So, they will store it, so we don't have to store it as a full dumpster at the Town Hall or at the highway over the weekend.

MR. DONAHUE: What about tires?

1 SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: We're taking tires. What's 2 the difference if we pick them up off the side of the road, and have to pay for them, we might as well keep them 3 4 5 MR. DONAHUE: Where are you putting the tires? 6 You're putting them in the dumpster? 7 NICK: No, no, we'll do those separate. SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: So, there are -- obviously, 8 9 what's really good about this Covid-19 is that it's giving 10 people a whole lot of time to clean up their basement, and 11 you can tell that people are spending extra time on their 12 properties and so I do think people will have a lot of 13 debris that they want to get rid of, so I just think it's 14 a good idea to do it sooner than later, because nobody is 15 going anywhere anyway. There's no glass bubble 16 (inaudible) -- last year we didn't pick up until the last 17 week of June, but it's a little different now. People are 18 ready to get rid of their stuff so it's a little different 19 now. 20 COUNCILPERSON BENSLEY: Elizabeth? 21 SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: (Inaudible) --22 COUNCILPERSON BENSLEY: What about paint? 23 SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: No. 24 COUNCILPERSON BENSLEY: No paint.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: That's considered hazardous.

COUNCILPERSON BENSLEY: Right.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: So, yeah, no -- last year we took 61 refrigerators. So, no refrigerators yet this year either. So -- all right, so then the last thing -- so anything else under unfinished business that we needed to discuss?

TOWN CLERK: Yes, the pipe lining, but we covered that already.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Okay.

TOWN CLERK: And then we just have the one on the new business that SusqueNango Kennel Club.

thing about unfinished business. It did come up recently -- so I don't know if you all remember the projects on the CBDG Grant Fund that was up here on top of Hawleyton Road, that project that had -- project -- now we spent -- we approved \$45 -- \$40,000 home improvement contract for them, but it came basically last week that they had some septic system problems, and so Phil with Thoma had called Nick and I, and wanted to see if that was something that was in -- possibly that we could finance for them, a grant, and I have to tell you I had some -- I am not sure if I agree that we should because we've already given him -- them \$40,000 and when I spoke last -- when we talked

about -- when I gave you the update -- so we have \$77,000 left, and that will help two to three people, \$25,000 a piece, and there are three people who are waiting to have their projects approved, or determine what the projects are and then have them approved. So, my opinion and I just -- we don't have to vote on it, I just want us to think we may be presented with the fact by the next Board Meeting, they may submit something for us to help. just want to say that I feel that -- I don't feel comfortable possibly taking money away from another resident that needs help, because we've already helped the Head house you know with probably the largest contract that we issued at \$40,000, but it's also a dire situation because there is a septic problem, but I just feel -- I don't feel that we should sacrifice -- my opinion is that we should not help one person, you know, to help them further. So, I just want you all to be thinking about that, because we may -- I said to Phil, well, before we could make any decision, we would have to know how much a septic system would cost, and then we have to go through the County, and then we would be able to make more of an informed decision, but I wanted you guys just to think about this may be a potential question that will come up in the near future.

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All right, then the last thing we have to talk about is I got a phone call from a Town resident, Sue Tong, she lives here on Park Avenue, and she is a member of the SusqueNango Kennel Club, and she has contacted Nick through the years and has asked if she could run and train her dogs in the ballfield that's next to the Fire Station that's just above Town Hall, and in that area, where it's fenced in, because it's fenced in because of the ballfield. So, she has trained her dogs and used it, and you know Nick said it didn't matter, it's fine, as long as she does the pickup, you know any of the dog poop, or whatever.

Now, she contacted us because they now want to be able to rent that piece of property from us, and put up actually training apparatus inside the ballfield, and they don't use Otsiningo Park for training, but because Otsiningo doesn't have a fenced in area, they can't leave their apparatus there, you know, the different agility things that they use. So, she called and asked if it would be something that we would consider, going forward like June, July, and August, that they would be allowed to use that fenced in area, and they have membership of between 70 and 75 people, but only about 25 people would use it, and it would be by an appointment. They only have

appointment, and they have liability insurance, they have obviously the full responsibility on them if somebody did steal some of their equipment. So, I wanted for us to talk about it and see how we feel. I'm open to questions or comments.

DEPUTY SUPERVISOR XLANDER: So, they would -the organization would -- would organize that, make the
appointments, monitor what's going on, and then in terms
of rent, was there a figure discussed?

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: She wasn't sure -- I mean I think she threw out like maybe \$100 a month, or something like that. I mean the monetary part isn't -- and I look at it as like we rent Jackson Park for a weekend, and the DWI Permit, they pay us \$700 to use the field during that tournament.

And then like last summer, the Coleman Road

Field for the -- it was a City of Binghamton -- I think it
was softball, right, Nick?

NICK: Yeah.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: They paid us to use our field twice a week during the summer at the Coleman Road. So, I think I look at it as that same type of -- and especially when I found out that they were allowed to train up at Otsiningo due to the open fields and so forth, but this is more convenient because they actually have a

1 fenced in area and that they would actually make it, or 2 they would actually rent pieces of fence that a fencing company would put in on a temporary thing, it would go 3 right in the dugout. You know, and they would put a key 5 on it so -- I mean you can't prevent somebody from jumping over the fence and stealing the equipment, but 6 7 they would make it as secure as possible. COUNCILPERSON NYE: Elizabeth, are they 8 9 residents of the Town of Binghamton? 10 SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Sue Tong is a resident of 11 the Town of Binghamton, yes. 12 COUNCILPERSON NYE: Who maintains it? 13 The Town of Binghamton. NICK: 14 SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: We do, but I think one of the things that we made safe for them because there's no 15 16 way we're asking, you know, our Parks Department to move 17 the equipment (inaudible) -- So, I think inside the field, 18 and she didn't say that. She said, she would maintain the 19 field inside the fence. We would on the outside, but they 20 would maintain it on the inside. Dean? 21 COUNCILPERSON NYE: That's a piece of property. 22 That's the Fire Department, Hawleyton Annex? 23 SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Yes. 24 COUNCILPERSON NYE: Do we have to get in touch

with them to be certain what --

1 SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Not now, because it's --2 COUNCILPERSON NYE: (Crosstalk) --3 SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Not now, that hasn't been alienated (inaudible) -- so --4 5 TOWN ATTORNEY POPE: Elizabeth, can I ask you, is that an open park, anybody can go use it? 6 7 SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: (Inaudible) --NICK: Yes. 8 9 SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: It's an open field, yes. 10 MR. POPE: And, so, are they suggesting that 11 only they could use the park? 12 SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: No, I don't think so. 13 mean I could ask them. She didn't say that, so I guess --14 she never said anything like that. So, if somebody wanted 15 to go in and use that park -- I mean I guess their equipment would be in there. 16 17 MR. POPE: I mean like the DWI Weekends and 18 stuff like that -- my understanding is anyone from the 19 public -- even though those ballfields are being rented, 20 anybody from the public can go in there and do whatever 21 they want other than using the ballfields when they're in 22 use. But if she's suggesting something similar, the 23 public can still go in and still have use of that park

area, then it's probably okay. If what she's suggesting

she's really going to try and control exclusive use of

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park, I don't know that you can alienate the public to a single person using park land.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Okay. I see that, because obviously the same thing like up at Coleman Road when they were using it on Tuesdays and Thursdays, then other people could go on Monday, Wednesdays and Fridays and use it.

MR. POPE: Or even when they're there, I mean somebody can come in and just walk around if they wanted, right? It was still open for use generally, except for a particular part, the ballfield itself?

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Right. Well, people could still go on, I mean the field is the only part -- the whole park is not fenced in, only the field is.

MR. POPE: So, I just -- I guess we just need to know more and we have to be careful that we're not renting the entirety of the parkland, you know, exclusively to one private venture, and it is a -- it's a business venture, right? She probably charges money

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: I don't think -- well, let's put it this way. I think what happens is -- I don't know if they charge money, because the (inaudible) itself charges dues I would assume, right, so -- this is not a profit, this is definitely -- I asked her that part. I said, you know, we can't rent this for you and then you

are charging people to use it, because that's a business then.

MR. POPE: Yeah. Let's get some more facts maybe.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Okay. So what facts do you want me to get?

MR. POPE: I think, you know, we have to decide, you know, is she asking for exclusive use, you know, for some period of time. It sounds like she wants to fence off at least part of the park and have it exclusively hers for day-to-day continuous use, as opposed to somebody rents, you know, the whole ballfield for a weekend, or rents the ballfield for Mondays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays. I just don't know that you can -- I mean I'll look at it, but I just don't know that you can take park land and -- and give it under contract to one individual for their exclusive use to the exclusion of the rest of people in the Town.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Okay.

COUNCILPERSON NYE: You should not do that.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Yeah -- no I agree with that, so I guess it's their decision, because obviously if they're going to lock it up to protect their equipment, then basically, it is exclusive.

1	MR. POPE: That's what it sounds like as opposed
2	to the ballfield, everybody gets done at the end of the
3	day. They take their bases and bats, and everything else,
4	and then they come back the next morning.
5	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Right. And she I don't
6	and she wants to leave the equipment. Now, I think if
7	she wanted to leave the equipment there, and somebody who
8	had a dog wanted to go in there and walk the dog and have
9	them play in the equipment that's a different story, but
10	she wants to lock it up.
11	MR. POPE: Right.
12	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Oh, okay.
13	DEPUTY SUPERVISOR XLANDER: So, does it make a
14	difference (crosstalk)
15	COUNCILPERSON NYE: (Crosstalk)
16	DEPUTY SUPERVISOR XLANDER: so does it make a
17	difference that she's just locking up a portion of that
18	property, as opposed to excluding people from the entirety
19	of the property.
20	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Or they would be able to use
21	it as a ballfield, but
22	DEPUTY SUPERVISOR XLANDER: Did you say no one?
23	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: If she locks up the field
24	is

1 DEPUTY SUPERVISOR XLANDER: I get that. I get 2 that, but there's a lot of other area -- you know, there's a lot of other area surrounding the ballfield on that plot 3 of land, isn't there? Could people use that? 4 5 NICK: No, there's not a whole lot. There's really nothing there, but the ballfield. 6 7 DEPUTY SUPERVISOR XLANDER: Oh, maybe I'm confused because the parking lot is so big. 8 9 NICK: Yeah. If you go -- if you go by the fire 10 station, but to the right, coming down from your house, 11 you could see the steel, you know --12 DEPUTY SUPERVISOR XLANDER: Yeah, I've been 13 there when my daughter played ball when she was little. 14 I mean as it is right now is not a lot of NICK: 15 people use the field at all, so it's a big argument --16 it's a big argument every year about getting it ready and 17 they don't use it, so that's why we pretty much don't do a 18 whole lot with it. 19 SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: But on the other hand, if 20 somebody did want, especially in this day and age if 21 somebody wanted to put together a ballgame --22 NICK: Right. 23 SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: -- they couldn't do it, 24 because her equipment, you know, is there.

NICK: Well, I mean the bottom line is she'd

have to pick it up every night and she'd have to make sure

the dog crap is picked up, too.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Look I actually think some

of the stuff is easy to pick up, I think, and some of the

of the stuff is easy to pick up, I think, and some of the -- I think she had some of these maybe these pyramid things, I don't know, but she says it takes two people to move them.

DEPUTY SUPERVISOR XLANDER: So, the only advantage for them with that property is the fencing, because otherwise they'd have to move their stuff. Here they'd have to move their stuff, but it appealed to them because of the fencing.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: I think it's nice because then the dogs, you know, because you're not afraid of dogs, obviously if they're being trained, but having the fencing there just gives them the security that the dogs are not going to run away.

DEPUTY SUPERVISOR XLANDER: Yeah.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: But to use -- like you said -- so it would be like I would say, you know, you can rent the park for the summer and not a resident can use it, basically, Alan, right?

MR. POPE: Yeah, that's the concern.

DEPUTY SUPERVISOR XLANDER: But they might still

want it if they can use it with the fencing, but we leave it open so other people when they're not there, other people can access that.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: And that may be the part that they're not looking at wanting, because they wanted - so I'll talk to them and then I'll get back with you guys if they want to pursue it, and they can come up with a solution for that, then I will bring it back to the Board for the next meeting.

Anything else?

COUNCILPERSON NYE: I've got just one item if I can.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Sure.

COUNCILPERSON NYE: The resident that just needs some advice I guess if possible. One of our residents has a problem with these mountain bikers on her property, actually three residents up here, and they've called asking what can we do, and I said other than putting barbed wire across and try to decapitate them, but -- and they've called the Sheriff's Department, there's not much help there, but I thought being Nick and Mike have, as well as others, have had a similar situation on private property. They posted it. They were taking the posters down. They're actually quite rude and obnoxious and

threatening to these property owners. So, I'll just throw that out if you've got any suggestions that we can quickly do and adjourn, that's all.

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NICK: Yeah, there's nothing we can do about it, and that's between them and the motor bikers, and don't put a barbed wire fence up and decapitate them, because then they're going to be liable.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: But let me ask you, because Mike Beasley I don't know if you know this, but back when bike riders were younger and there were dirt bikes and stuff at the end of our property there was an access into the back of the big open field, but part of that property is owned by our neighbors and go into the creek, and what they did is they put a fence up there. It was something very obvious, just two poles and a big metal fence, so that -- and they left it, so that my son and his buddies couldn't ride their dirt bikes up behind that and because it -- obviously it gets noisy and you got -- and it can -you know kids on their dirt bikes and it's a little crazy, and he did, and I don't think it was illegal for him. put a fence there and blocked off the access to his property. So, is that legal, Alan?

MR. POPE: Sure. You can do whatever you want on your property. You just can't create a trap, you know, a hazard for somebody that comes on your property.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: But the fence was very obvious. It was a big fence. It was, you know, 10 feet. It wasn't a fence, it was more of a gate that they latched together. COUNCILPERSON NYE: (Inaudible) mountain bikes, you know the peddle jobbies and I said that to her, but I said unfortunately they're creative, and they find a way

you know the peddle jobbies and I said that to her, but I said unfortunately they're creative, and they find a way around it. (Inaudible) bike club, I guess, over on maybe Park Avenue or wherever it's located, actually had it on their website that there was a trail to run, and they sent — the attorney sent the letter to the club and told them to take that off their website which they did, but it's pretty much, I guess, now by word of mouth. They could put up mounds but they might use those to jettison themselves up in the air, which I guess is fun for them. I don't know. A fence, a gate of some sort might be — might be the best solution.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: It's just probably a deterrent --

COUNCILPERSON NYE: I wasn't sure if you had any other experiences with this.

COUNCILPERSON LEIGHTON: What road is that property on?

COUNCILPERSON NYE: We think they're coming off
-- well, we think they're coming up Brown Road and perhaps

going -- skirting Maynard Fahs' property then down

Thistlewood to the bend and then they jump into the woods

there and peddle down to Laurie Brook, and from Laurie

Brook they go the back road over the personal properties

to Cynthia and I'm not sure where the hell they go from

there. I don't think down Cynthia -- I don't know -- they

pass by my house all the time on the highway -- you know

on the roadway, not through the woods.

COUNCILPERSON BENSLEY: Hey Dean, there's a possibility that they could put up some trail cameras, too, and try to make some identifications, and if you can do that and turn the video --

COUNCILPERSON NYE: The guy who did that apparently, I forgot her name now, Kaufman, I think, but she's got some 300 acres up on the hill, and (inaudible) they put up signs that they tore down. But he did put up a camera because they were rat squatters, no, they were stealing lumber. They were sawing trees and stealing lumber. (Inaudible) put up a camera. What I suggested perhaps is just a sign saying that under surveillance, and if you're identified you will be prosecuted to the full extent of the law. I said the conscious riders will pay attention to that, I think. The scoundrels aren't going to, no matter what you do or say. They probably aren't going to change --

1 SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Right. 2 COUNCILPERSON NYE: -- but if they can get the 3 law in, sure these people (inaudible) a path, sure it would make those neighbors happy. So, we got fence and 4 5 the sign. Anything else? SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: I'm just laughing at Nick. 6 7 What do you have (inaudible) --The Tiger King there, whatever it's 8 9 called. 10 SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: There are Kathy's sunglasses 11 back there. I do actually have one more (inaudible) --12 COUNCILPERSON NYE: Thank you for your help. 13 SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: I got a phone call from, I 14 think, it's Dave Hibbard, Mike over on Maxian Road, and he 15 is concerned about the parking problem at Aqua Terra. 16 have to call him back, but he wants to know would the 17 County be willing to put like no parking signs, because I 18 don't think people are parking in the parking lot. 19 They're just parking on the road. Mike? 20 COUNCILPERSON LEIGHTON: I hear there's a lot of 21 people over there using the park on nice days, so you know 22 with everyone being home --23 MR.DONAHUE: There's about 40 cars a day on

Saturdays and Sundays. The only thing that -- the only

thing that we could do is do a local law, no parking.

1 SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Can't the County take care 2 of that, it's a county (crosstalk) --3 MR. DONAHUE: It's our street. It's our street. We'd be liable for it. 4 5 SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: So, is the parking lot open? 6 Can people drive into Aqua Terra? 7 MR. DONAHUE: Yes, they can , but they do not use that because the County has one side Aqua Terra Park 8 9 is locked down, chained off. The park is on the Innsbruck 10 side and people just don't want to -- by the way, down to 11 the end of the park, we (inaudible) the way over, because 12 the majority of the people are going to Aqua Terra, they 13 don't live down to the Innsbruck side unless they're going 14 up --15 They're just going down to SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: 16 the park side you're saying? 17 MR. DONAHUE: Yes. 18 SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Good. 19 MR. DONAHUE: They're parking on both sides of 20 the streets, you know, and it's kind of narrow. 21 SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: But if that's what Dave is 22 saying, so --23 MR. DONAHUE: And --24 SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: -- so what can we do -- can 25 we put no parking signs there?

1	MR. DONAHUE: Yes, you'd have to do a local law,
2	and pretty much put no parking from this point to that
3	point.
4	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: All right. So, do you want
5	to get that information? Can we pass that like next week?
6	That's when I'd have to post it, right?
7	MR. DONAHUE: You have to have a public hearing
8	on it and everything. Right, Alan, the local law for no
9	parking?
10	MR. POPE: Yeah, you'd have to go through the
11	process.
12	MR. DONAHUE: It's going to be about 30/60 days,
13	correct?
14	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Well, it's better I'll
15	talk to Dave tomorrow, and just ask him if we can do a
16	local law and get the process started, but it won't be
17	fixed for a few days for a few months.
18	MR. DONAHUE: Yeah, you can tell him.
19	SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Okay.
20	COUNCILPERSON LEIGHTON: How bad is it? Like
21	are they taking up both sides of the street?
22	MR. DONAHUE: Yeah.
23	COUNCILPERSON LEIGHTON: Are they
24	MR. DONAHUE: Because the ditches are kind of
25	going up on the left hand side of the you know, it's

going out towards the left hand side, the ditches are kind of deep. Of course, you've got to get room to get out, so you're like -- you're parked halfway in the road, three-quarters of the way in the road, so the passenger can get out and then the other people go out to the other side, so now it's pretty much, you know, just a one -- one lane, you know, for -- like the other day there was probably about 300 or 400 feet was just one lane, because of the way people park.

COUNCILPERSON LEIGHTON: Remember we don't have

MR. DONAHUE: Park cars -- park cars on the street.

COUNCILPERSON LEIGHTON: -- police, you know, employed by the Town to issue tickets.

SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Right.

MR. DONAHUE: And then you would have to have the Sheriff's Department come up to issue tickets and the Sheriff's Department is going to tell you, we're not going on that property because it's Broome Security property. That's all one of the controversies. The sheriffs will not respond out here because it's a county park, and it's Broome Security's problem. So maybe -- what I would do first is maybe talk to Jason about it, and say talk to your Parks Department, and maybe if they could get some

1 signage there where to park, it would be helpful and then 2 also to have him talk to Broome Security and say we're really get an influx because the -- the people up here, 3 that you need some Broome security patrol. 4 5 SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Okay, I can do that. 6 COUNCILPERSON LEIGHTON: Get some pictures on 7 the weekends when it happens. SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: Well, I can ask Dave about 8 9 it, too, the man who called with the complaint. 10 obviously an ongoing problem. 11 All right. I will definitely talk to Jason and 12 see how we can manage that because it's obviously a 13 safety issue if you have somebody who can't see between 14 cars, or you know I think part of it is, is people would 15 like to walk down the road, because obviously a lot of 16 people are out walking and, you know, it's kind of a 17 safety issue, if your roads are -- you know if there's 45 18 cars parked, you know, on either side of the road. 19 So, okay, I'll talk to Jason and bring that back 20 at the Board Meeting. 21 All right. Anything else? 22 MR. DONAHUE: Elizabeth, did you hear anything 23 about the Memorial Day Parade? 24 SUPERVISOR ROUNDS: I did talk to Jerry.

called me the other day, and you know he said what do you

think about having it on Veterans' Day. I said, well, first of all, Veterans' Day can be really cold, and so it won't be quite the same. So, I said why don't we have it up at Jackson Park. We can do something for the veterans on Memorial Day, honoring veterans, and we can have it on the lower field. We could also have the Fire Department control -- but you can't social distance at the cemetery. You know, there's usually about anywhere from 150 to 200 people at the cemetery, and there's no social distancing there, and so I said to him, why don't we see if we can kind of have a (inaudible) come in from the back side of Jackson, and have a little parade going into Jackson Park, having the service and, you know, honoring the veterans there, and we could guarantee -- you know, we could even put a line down the field and things like that where we could distance.

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I want things to get back to normal. It kills me that we wouldn't be able to have it, but I could present that to the Fire Department and see, but I don't also know -- you know, in an hour if we could keep social distancing, and it wouldn't be until the end of May, so I'm waiting to hear back from Jerry.

Anything else? All right if there's nothing else, I'd like to adjourn this meeting, make a motion to adjourn this meeting.
