Over 130 kids are registered and ready to begin play in the 2021 Town of Binghamton baseball and softball programs, varying in ages from 4 to 13 and playing at four different skill/age levels from T-ball through Little League. The Youth Commission has worked diligently in an effort to provide an as-close-to-normal season as possible.

Extra steps will be taken with all teams to follow the guidelines. The game schedules were made keeping the state spectator limits in mind and as a result, at least initially, we do not expect a need to enforce a limit on the number of spectators allowed at the Park. Spring has sprung and we're so happy to see longer and warmer days! With that being said, we're getting our spring road cleanup underway. Because of the mild temperatures we had a few weeks ago, we were able to get a jump start on some of our projects. You may have already seen the sweeper out and about cleaning along the curb lines. We've even

started our spring brush & branch cleanup earlier than normal, and it will continue until May 14, 2021 (see details below). We'll also be fixing potholes and filling in road shoulders that need it. As the season continues, we'll move on to ditch cleaning and paving. We have East Hamton Rd., Dogwood Drive, & St. Clair Road on the schedule for repaving this year, so you might see some preparation work being done in those areas beforehand. We'll also be doing sanitary pipe lining on East Hamton Road.

As some of you already know, winter can wreck havoc on your driveways and pipes. If you notice that you're in need of a new driveway pipe, the Town will install one at no cost, but the home-owner is responsible for the cost of the pipe. If you decide you need a new pipe, give us a call at 669-4323, and we'll measure it out and get a price for the pipe for you! Thanks, and enjoy the spring!

TREE BRANCH & BRUSH PICKUP IS NOW UNDERWAY. ENDS MAY 14, 2021.

The Town of Binghamton Highway Dept. is currently picking up branches. The last day for pickup will be Friday, May 14, 2021. Please call the Highway Dept. at 669-4323 to have your name placed on our list.

This pickup is for TREE BRANCHES ONLY. No cuttings from any kind of bush. Due to the overwhelming response to this service, you will not be given a specific time or day when your brush will be picked up; simply call then place your pile at the curb or edge of the road. In addition, there are certain guidelines to be followed:

- 1. Tree branches from your yard only;
- 2. Put branches neatly along the curb/roadside in front of your home;
- 3. Please place the large end of the branch towards the road, and leave the branches as long as possible;
- 4. No brush from clearing your lot;
- 5. No brush from contractors or landscapers. (This means if you hire someone to maintain your lawn, they need to dispose of the debris; we will not take it.)
- 6. Large piles must be approved.

The following items WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED and will be left behind: tree trunks; roots of any sort; clippings from lawns, flower beds, or vegetable gardens; thorny brush and small twigs; leaves and animal waste.



The Water/Sewer Billing Schedule for 2021 is as follows: (these are approximate mailing dates)

November 1, 2020 (1st billing of a cycle); due in early Dec. February 1, 2021 (2nd billing); due in early March May 1, 2021 (3rd billing); due in early June

August 1, 2021 (4th billing); due in early September

GETTING MARRIED AND IN NEED OF A MARRIAGE LICENSE? WE CAN HELP!

The following documents are required to apply for a marriage license:

- Original birth certificates with the raised seal or a certified copy
- Any and all divorce decrees (must be original with the raised seal or a certified copy)
- Photo ID (driver's license preferred)

You'll need an appointment to purchase a Marriage License, so please call the Town Clerk's office ahead of time. Appointments are scheduled Monday thru Friday from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. Please keep in mind that a Marriage License has a 24-hour waiting period before it can be used and is only valid for 60 days. Both parties need to be present.

<u>A Marriage License Application</u> will need to be filled out before arriving. (These are available at the Town Hall or on the website for download.) This will help save time when at the window. The fee for a Marriage License is \$40, and cash, check, or credit card payments are accepted.

A rabies clinic will be held on Wednesday, May 5, 2021 from 6 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. at the Town of Binghamton Highway Garage, 865 Hawleyton Rd., Town of Binghamton. Rabies shots are free to TOWN OF BINGHAMTON residents' dogs, cats, and ferrets. Town of Binghamton residents are required to show proof of residency (photo ID required). Non-Town of Binghamton residents will be requested to make a \$5 donation.

WHAT IS "TAXABLE STATUS DATE"? Joseph Cook, Assessor



Rabies

Here's just a bit of information about the tax year. The tax year, for assessment purposes, is a fiscal year that begins July 1 and runs through the following June 30. Each year the Assessor's Office establishes a new tentative tax roll on May 1 that goes into effect on July 1.

The assessment that is shown on that new July 1 tax roll reflects the status of the property on March 1, which is called "taxable status date". This becomes important information for you if you are building a new house, constructing an addition to your existing house, demolishing a building, etc.

As an example, if your home is 50% complete as of March 1, the July 1 tax roll reflects 50% of the finished value of the home. The assessment then does not change again until the following tax year, because once the July 1 tax roll becomes effective, it is frozen by law and cannot change (up or down).

Property Maintenance issues are always at the top of my list in the spring because once winter is over and the snow has melted, junk is on view for everyone to see. If you receive a violation letter from this office, you need to respond immediately. I'm always willing to work with the property owner as long as corrective action is taken within a reasonable amount of time. If the property owner doesn't respond to my letter by calling my office and speaking with me, my only option is to turn the matter over to Town Court. If you're unsure as to what is or is not acceptable, the Town Code can be viewed on our website or <u>click here</u>. It's a great way to familiarize yourself with what is and what is not allowed in our Town.

I'm assuming you've already read that the Town is once again holding "Municipal Cleanup Days". This is a great opportunity to get rid of unwanted items that have been stored in your yard, garage, house, or basement. I highly encourage all of you to take advantage of this service and clean up around your property. I'd also like to encourage each of you to clean up any trash that has blown into your yard or into your ditches during the winter. Thanks, everyone.

Now that spring is here, we'll be spending more time outdoors with our pets, so I thought I'd share a few tips to keep your pets healthy and safe this spring:

- Check with your veterinarian to see what's recommended for Heartworm and Lyme
 Disease. Heartworm is transmitted by mosquitoes and Lyme Disease is transmitted by ticks; both
 can be fatal. Be sure to also ask your vet about all-natural flea and tick treatments.
- If you enjoy taking your dog for a ride in a car or truck, if at all possible, confine it in a crate or use a seat belt safety harness. Never allow your dog to ride in the back of a truck or hang its head out a window. Also, don't leave your dog confined in a car on a hot day. It can be a deadly mistake!
- Make sure you license your dog with the Town Clerk's office. ID tags should be kept on your dog's collar at all times and will assist me when I try to reunite you and your dog. The best ID's are license tags and microchips. Most veterinarians can chip your dog. Just ask the next time you take your dog for a check-up. Most importantly, if your dog gets loose, call me on my cell at 217-8857. There's nothing better than to be able to reunite a pet with its owner.

HISTORICAL SOCIETY / HAZARDOUS WASTE DATES / COMMUNITY CENTER

GREETINGS FROM THE BINGHAMTON TOWNSHIP HISTORICAL SOCIETY!



I'd like to start off by saying that our museum will be OPEN on Memorial Day from 10 a.m. until 1 p.m.! We'd like to encourage everyone to stop in for a tour after the Memorial Day parade! It feels so nice to be getting back to normal, doesn't it? With that said, we thought it would be fun to share some interesting stories we have on file at our historical

museum, and we'd like to begin by sharing some history of the Stevens Family who settled on Stevens Road in the 1800's.

The Stevens family is descended from an immigrant Quaker by the name of Timothy Stevens who was the first to arrive from England. His descendant, Daniel, was an early settler of the Town of Binghamton, having purchased 110 acres at the corner of Morgan Road and the now named Stevens Road. Daniel's son, George, was born in the homestead on Morgan Road in 1856. George earned a teaching certificate from Cortland Normal School (now a college in the SUNY system) and he became a teacher, teaching in the many one-room schoolhouses in the Towns of Binghamton and Conklin. George kept a yearly diary from 1856 until just before his death in 1937 in which he describes the many hardships he endured. The diaries were originally written in pencil and longhand, but the Binghamton Township Historical Society has a typed copy which is now kept in our Oral Histories Collection. It is fascinating reading! We'll submit some of the stories from his diaries in future editions of *Town Talk*, but feel free to visit our museum where you can read them

there, or you can also purchase a digital copy in either CD or Flash Drive format. The Historical Society's Museum is open by appointment. IN THE SPOTLIGHT (FEATURING TOM EGAN & ACCESS UNLIMITED)



In this edition, we're featuring ACCESS UNLIMITED, a local business owned by Tom Egan (Hance Road) that customizes vehicles and homes to assist people who are physically challenged. Tom gave me a little history which I found to be quite interesting. I hope you do, too.

It all began about 35 years ago when Tom's dream was to own a body shop where he could customize cars and vans and put his creative skills to constructive use. In March 1986, he moved his fledgling company, "Craftsmen Auto Body Clinic" to 570 Hance Road. While showcasing a custom van his team had created for an Oakdale Mall event in the 1980's, complete with shaved door handles, a "frenched-in" antenna, gullwing door and other accessories, Tom was placed next to a vendor selling home medical equipment and wheelchairs. Soon Tom and the vendor were chatting and exchanging ideas. The vendor suggested that his company get involved in installing hand controls for local folks with disabilities, and Tom greeted the challenge with great enthusiasm. Some time later, Dan Cullen from Conklin, whose disability requires the use of a wheelchair adaptive van, stopped by Tom's shop to have his van rust proofed. When Tom looked inside Dan's van, he noticed that it was designed so that Dan could drive right from his wheelchair! While Tom appreciated the freedom that Dan's modified van offered him, it really bothered him that Dan didn't have many of the comforts and aesthetics that non-disabled folks enjoyed. Shortly thereafter, Dan, who worked for the Southern Tier Independence Center, contacted Tom to ask if he could create a custom sewing chair for a local seamstress with Multiple Sclerosis who needed to swivel and raise from one level to another as she moved from machine to machine. Tom took a basic office chair, designed a drive mechanism and control circuitry for it, and converted it into a practical, comfortable, and efficient solution for her so that she could continue to do the work she loved. Tom received so much gratification from this project that he was compelled to turn his business in a new direction, making disability access the company's main focus.

By 1991, Tom's company was the main company in the Southern Tier to offer customized wheelchairaccessible vehicles, yet he still wasn't satisfied with what the company had accomplished. He wanted his equipment to open up a far wider range of vehicle mobility options for his disabled customers. Tom became involved in various organizations and sat on various state and national policy-making committees in order to move his company and his profession to the next level. His focus was on setting standards for this new-andupcoming field and to put the disabled consumer in the driver's seat, literally and figuratively, with all of the comforts, choices, accessibility, and freedom that others enjoy every day. Tom succeeded in his endeavor, and in 1993, he changed his company's name to "Access Unlimited".

Today, Access Unlimited manufactures and distributes products to customers all over the world, offering options that will turn any make and model vehicle into a wheelchair-accessible vehicle. They are also the only company in the world to offer accessibility options for private boats, and the number one company in the world for accessibility options for RVs and motorhomes. Changes in consumer purchasing patterns due to safety considerations under COVID-19 have created significantly increased demand for the products they manufacture. By the way, during the early stages of the COVID crisis, Tom and his team put their manufacturing capabilities and expertise to good use to produce PPE, including face shields, facemasks, and even patient gowns which they provided at no cost to area first responders and hospitals. *THANK YOU for giving back to the community, Tom!*

Finally, Tom wanted to mention something he feels is very important. In 1987, he had a fire at his business. The TOB Vol. Fire Company snuffed out the fire quickly, but he never forgot what they did. They saved his business. If it hadn't been for the TOB Vol. Fire Company, he is convinced they would not be where they are today. He strongly feels that the support he and his company have received from neighbors and the Town over the years have been an integral part of the success of his business. The kindness of strangers 33 years ago saved his building and his business.
